Dear All,

Last year's newsletter never made it to the press, for reasons that will become clear later.

After imposing ourselves on Pat and Archie (Burton cousins) for our first night, a hectic week was spent in clearing out the house and cleaning up. Michael and Katharine did a great job of painting several rooms, and arranged for new carpet to be laid. Consequently, the house had more appeal to buyers, though it did not sell until September, after a couple of false starts.

Part of the cleanup involved dealing with a lifetime's accumulation of letters, papers and photographs, and I ended up shipping a large trunk full of these to Canada. Michael subsequently found another suitcase of the same in the rafters in the garage, and mailed this back home too. I have since gone through some of this stuff, and have found all the letters that Dad sent to Mother during his first voyage to Nigeria, and during the time he spent in Nigeria up until Mother joined him there. They make interesting reading, as they record his first impressions of life there. Likewise, there are many letters that Mother sent back to her sisters and father, which also give her impressions. There is a lot of reading yet to come, but I find this view into their past to be fascinating.

A significant part of our vacation this year was spent in England, following our commitments in Otley. We were able to visit Rosemary and Barry Jones (Mallinson cousins), and spent a day on their canal boat near



Bedford in the pouring rain. Although we all got soaked, we enjoyed the experience immensely, particularly as we finished up the day with dinner in Cambridge where Rowena (who we had not seen since 1980) joined us. This was followed by a night's stay with John and Janet Burton (cousins) near Welwyn Garden City, and dinner at their golf club. Many thanks are due to both couples for their unstinting hospitality. From there, we headed to Shropshire where we stayed a few nights near Ludlow and Church Stretton, and were able to meet up with John's brothers, Michael and Roger, and visit their mother, Gladys, in her retirement home. We also managed some hiking on The Mynd.

Sue and I celebrated our 30th wedding anniversary on June 25th this year.
